■ SEATS UP

✓ House = 435 seats of 435

- 218 seats to control

- D's needed 23 seats for control – flipped 40

✓ Senate = 35* seats of 100

✓ 26 of 35 - held by Ds, including 2 I's

✓ 9 of 35 – held by Rs

✓ D's needed 2 seats for control – lost 2

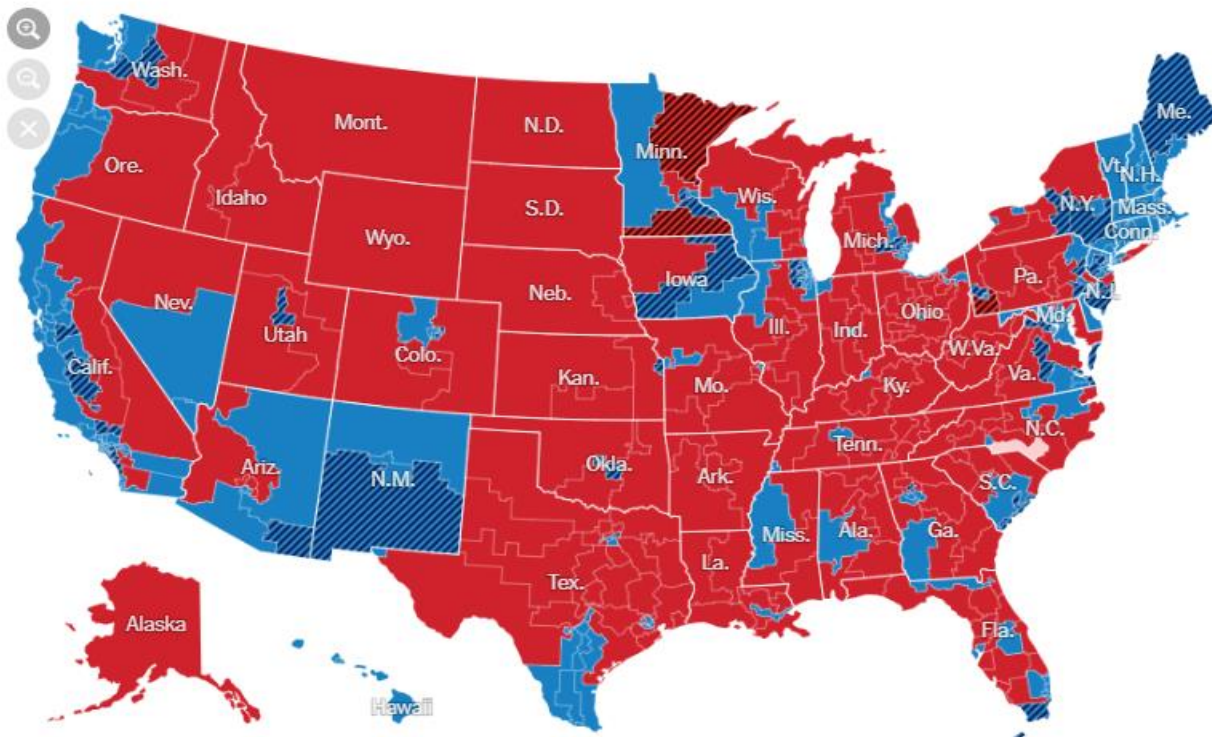

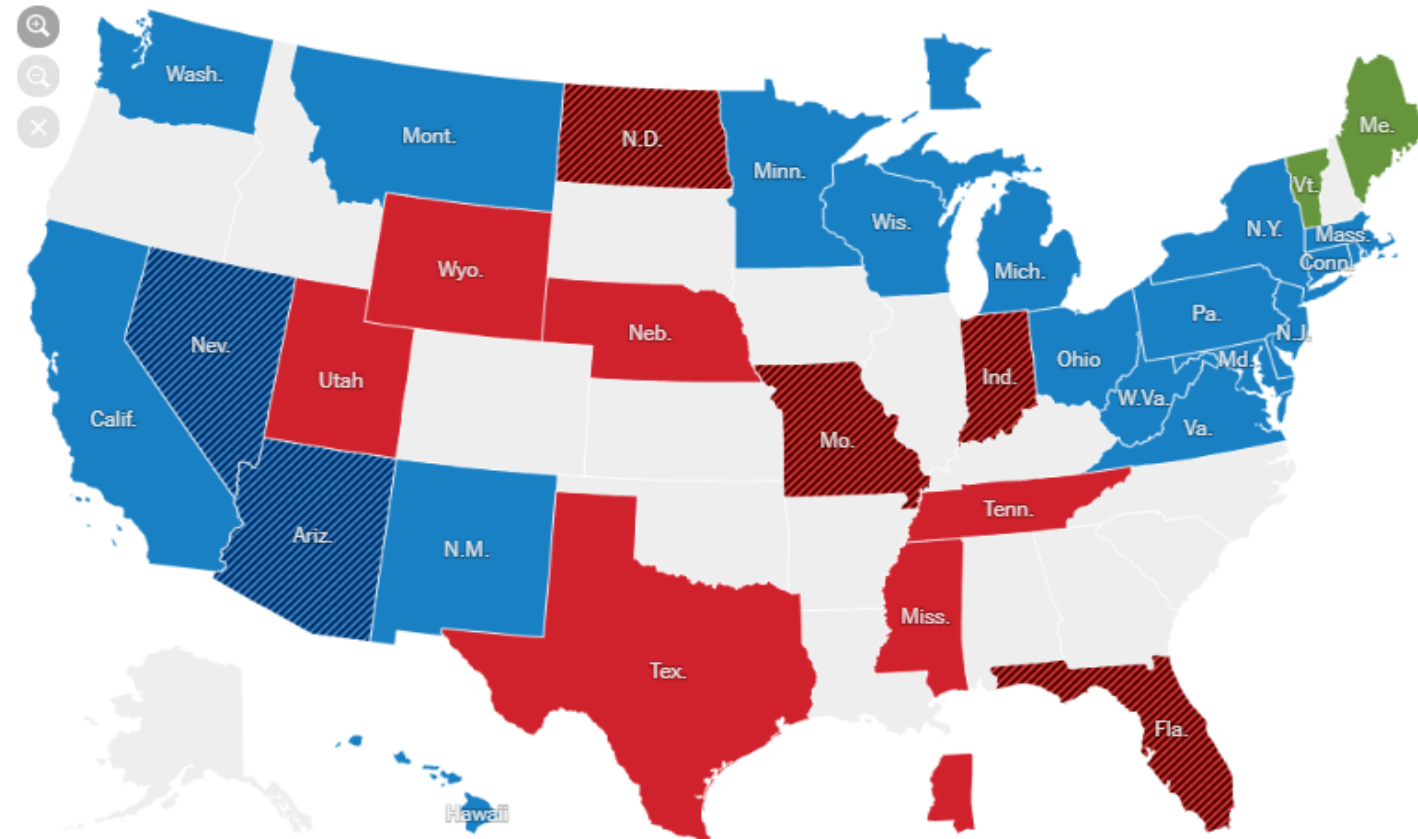

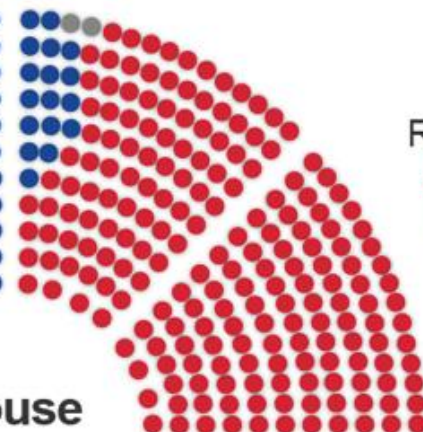

116th CONGRESS PRIORITIES

- **INFRASTRUCTURE**
 - ✓ **Chairman DeFazio is planning for a May introduction of his \$500+ million infrastructure bill. The Administration is also working on a package.**
- **OVERSIGHT / INVESTIGATIONS**
 - ✓ **House Democrats are eager to use their subpoena power to investigate the Administration.**
- **HEALTH CARE**
 - ✓ **House Democrats want to protect preexisting conditions – many Republicans agreed during the campaign.**
- **NOMINATIONS**
 - ✓ **McConnell is eager to get back to approving Judicial and Executive Branch nominations, but the Senate has been focused on the shutdown.**
- **VOTING RIGHTS / REDISTRICTING**
 - ✓ **House Democrats introduced H.R. 1 – related to voting rights and automatic voter registration**

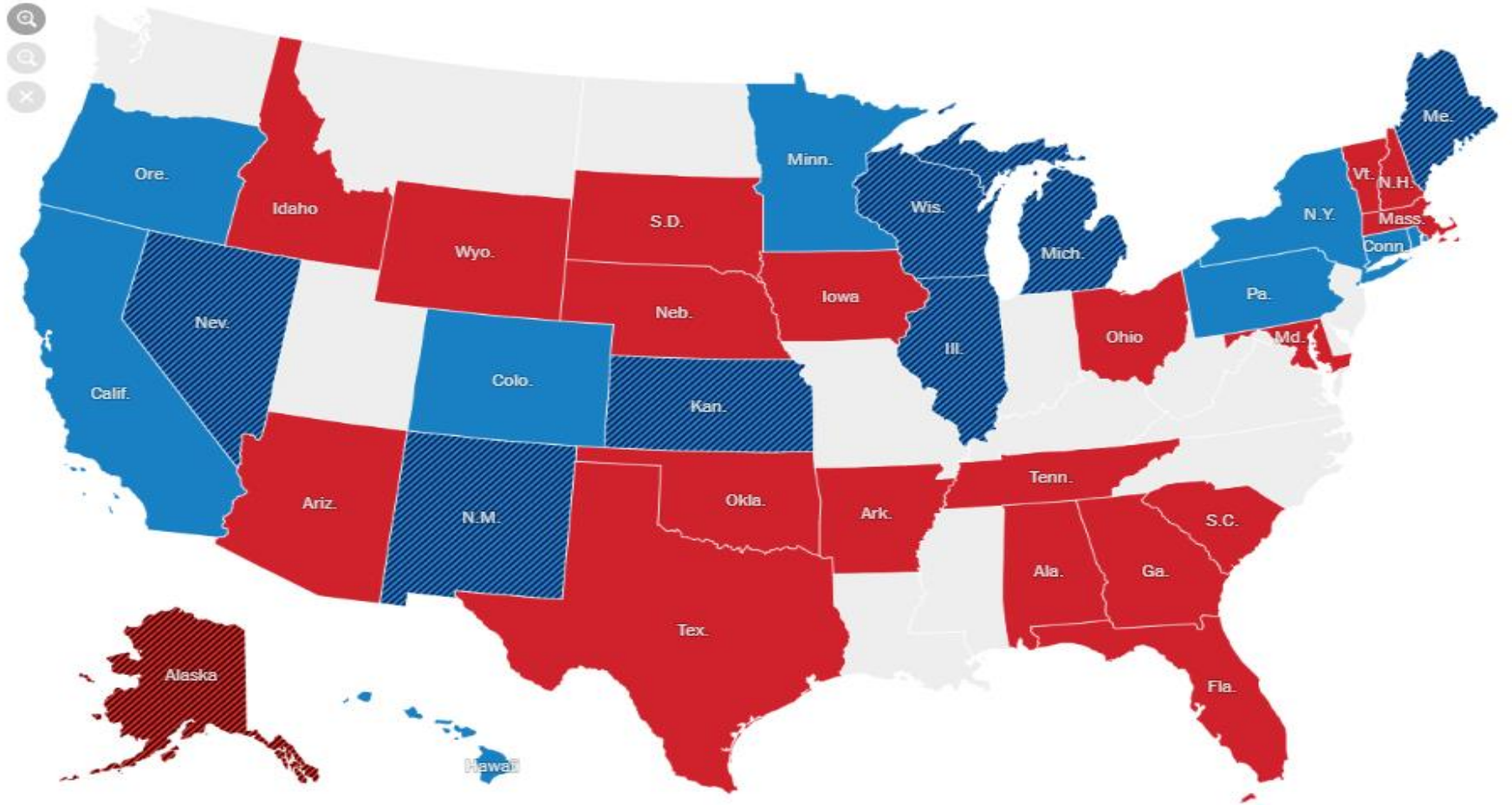
